

# Georgian cottage Scottish Georgian detached cottage (1750-1850)

Single-family houses commonly found in rural and sometimes in urban areas in Scotland. Originally, cottages were built on the estate of wealthy landowners to provide accommodation for estate workers and their families. Cottages had a piece of cultivated land to provide food. Nowadays, the word 'cottage' is predominantly used in the UK for small houses in rural areas
